

Costar, numbers to one million

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Costar

- Use the verb **costar** (o → ue) to talk about what something costs.
- **Costar** is usually only used in the third person.

La blusa **cuesta** treinta dólares.

Las botas **cuestan** setenta dólares.

Numbers to one million

- To tell what something costs, you may need to use larger numbers.

100 cien

101 ciento uno(a)

102 ciento dos

200 doscientos(as)

300 trescientos(as)

400 cuatrocientos(as)

500 quinientos(as)

600 seiscientos(as)

700 setecientos(as)

800 ochocientos(as)

900 novecientos(as)

1.000 mil

2.000 dos mil

1.000.000 un millón (de)

Numbers and gender agreement

- Use **uno** when counting.
- **Uno** changes to **un** before a **masculine** noun and **una** before a **feminine** noun: **veintiún** dólares, **veintiuna** faldas.

Tengo **ciento un** dólares.

Tengo **veintiuna** bolsas.

Numbers and gender agreement

- **Cien(to)** is used with both **masculine** and **feminine** nouns, but 200, 300, and so on agree with the noun they modify.
- Mil does not change.

cien dólares **ciento** dos dólares

cien personas **ciento** dos personas

doscientos dos dólares **doscientas** dos personas

mil dólares **mil** personas

Un millón and the preposition de

- **Un millón** changes to **millones** in the plural.

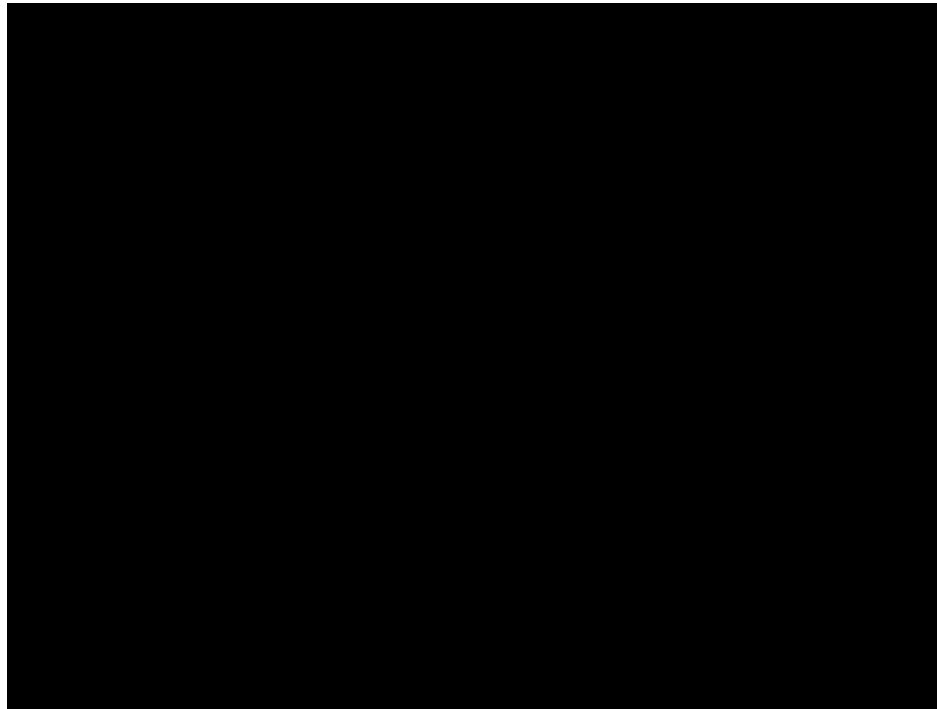
3.520.312 = tres **millones**, quinientos veinte mil, trescientos doce

- Use **de** after **millon(es)** when it is followed by a noun.

un millón de dólares

dos millones de personas
